

SVdP Food Distributions Kick Into High Gear To Meet Demand

For millions across the country, 2020 has been a continuous stream of challenges. The need for emergency assistance has grown considerably in the East Bay, with many people seeking aid for the first time. Together, with our Vincentians, volunteers, donors and community partners, SVdP has been able to help thousands of residents face these times with more certainty and security.

Since April, with the help of our community partners, we have been able to host 30 drive-through and walk-up food distributions feeding over 70,000 people. At these Free Food Distributions, thousands of pounds of healthy food are distributed. We have seen many new faces at these food distributions - people who have never requested help before. Additionally, SVdP has been helping to get food to community members who have been unable to leave their homes.

In addition to the large scale food distributions, the SVdP Conferences (branches) continue to operate 18 food pantries and have served over 30,000 people since March. Some SVdP food pantries, (Bay Point, Oakley and Pinole), have doubled and almost tripled the weekly number of people helped during this crisis. The SVdP Free Dining Room, operated in partnership with Loaves and Fishes of Contra Costa, is offering meals "to-go" 7 days per week, ensuring safe distribution of hot meals to the hungry every single day.

With over 15,000 cases of the virus documented in Contra Costa, the health and economic inequalities are hitting our low income neighbors very hard. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and volunteers, SVdP is helping many of our neighbors in the county shoulder these burdens. Your compassion during this crisis is admirable and awe-inspiring.

Keeping Volunteers Safe
Spurred on by the pandemic, new challenges have arisen in the mission of helping our neighbors in Contra Costa County. An explosion of need has arisen as thousands lose their income and healthcare. In face of growing demand, organizations like St. Vincent de Paul of Contra Costa County are providing their volunteers the utmost in health and safety measures.

For our Vincentian volunteers, like Larry Lynch of St. David of Wales Conference in Richmond, the drive to help our neighbors has only increased. Larry and his wife Patty are regular faces at SVdP food distributions. Larry said he feels very safe volunteering with SVdP. "Whenever we volunteer, there are temperature checks and health checks," Larry said. "Everyone wears a mask. SVdP gives us gloves and hand sanitizer and everyone stands apart."

The panemdic has caused non-profit community organizations like SVdP to find new ways to work together.

"I've seen so many denominations of faith come together to give, it's uplifting," Larry said. "This pandemic is like the wildfires, they'll come and go but need and poverty will be there when they've gone. St. Vincent de Paul has been around for almost 200 years – right now there are over 900,000 unpaid volunteers throughout the globe who believe in God and helping people, it's really inspiring."

"We've been working hard during the shelter-in-place to deliver food to our low-income neighbors who are unable to afford food." Larry said, describing living the mission of face-to-face visits inspired by St. Vincent de Paul. "I'm not scared at all. I've been blessed with a wife who has done this work with me for 50 years — it's our duty."

Caring For The Uninsured

The need to provide equitable access to healthcare has certainly been highlighted by events this year.

While the COVID-19 pandemic forced the RotaCare Pittsburg Free Medical Clinic at St. Vincent de Paul to modify service to telephone appointments initially, it is back to seeing patients face-to-face since August.

The health and safety of our volunteers and patients has never been more paramount. With an abundance of new safety equipment and protocols, the clinic is proud to provide face-to-face healthcare to the underserved and uninsured in the county once again.

Our patients, like Martha of Pittsburg, are uninsured. Working at a restaurant, her employer does not offer health insurance, and it's too expensive on her limited income to get adequate healthcare.

Until she felt ill, healthcare was not a priority. Luckily, the free medical clinic was here to help her through her diagnosis of diabetes and hypertension. "I appreciate the volunteers here so much," Martha says, "even when they lovingly scold me to make lifestyle changes."

Martha uses many of the clinic's services including primary care, flu shorts, diabetes education and healthy-cooking classes.

"The clinic is for people who have no other access," says Hamid Khonsari, M.D., the clinic's volunteer medical director. "It makes a big impact in the community."

Housing Our Neighbors
Between 2000 and 2018, the average rent in the Bay Area increased by 223%, with no significant growth in wages for low-income workers. California has added 1 unit of housing for every 5.4 jobs that have been added, and as the coronavirus takes its economic toll, the threat of homelessness is greater than ever.

With support from our generous donors, SVdP's conferences (branches) provide rental assistance to help vulnreable families stay in their homes — families like Ruby's. Ruby and her husband Rajiv had good jobs catering corporate and special events, but that all changed with COVID-19.

"In March everything was cancelled." Ruby said. "Our incomes disappeared overnight." Ruby and Rajiv were faced with a stark choice: change their entire life, or face homelessness.

"Luckily, we heard about rental assistance from SVdP," Ruby said. "Without any income, we were going to lose our home." Ruby is scared that the coronavirus will stop her from working in her industry for years to come. "I think it might take years before things go back to normal," Ruby said.

Ruby has been hired in the new group of SVdP's Workforce Development Program participants, a program that provides paid training and experience. "I look forward to learning skills in the Workforce Development Program that will help me feel comfortable looking for new work.'
