RIP TYRONE MARSHALL 8/2/57-12/20/21

For the last years of his life Tyrone lived at an Antioch bus stop. He didn't have a tent. Just a blanket or a sleeping bag. I would yell "Hi

Tyrone" as I passed him on my bike. He had a mental illness and couldn't talk clearly, but he would smile and mumble something unintelligible. Sometimes I would give him a Clif bar, but normally he refused all assistance.

Several years ago, a person told me that when his own father was homeless that every month someone would come by and ask him if was ready to move indoors. After three years his dad decided that he was ready. So that is what I did, but he would always answer that he was happy there. I would see cars stop and hand him a bag of food.

One friend said that Tyrone gave her money to buy some food from the store across the street since they would not let him inside. As soon as she got out of his sight, she threw the money away because it was so dirty and reeked with a terrible odor. She bought him what he wanted and gave him the change so that he would think that she used his money. On another occasion he actually tried to give her money just for being so nice to him.

Today there are flowers and candles where he used to sleep. A lot of people on Nextdoor talk about their interactions with him and how he was always friendly. I don't know what caused his death. Some suspect the cold weather, but he seemed content even when it was 40 degrees.

RIP TYRONE MARSHALL - Continued

How did our society get to the point where the homeless die on the street? As a former congressman once said, "If it was easy to solve, it would have been fixed a long time ago."

Tyrone has a daughter that lives nearby, two grandchildren, six siblings and countless cousins, nieces, and nephews. He grew up in the Bay Area, worked at the shipyard and studied the martial arts so that he could be like Bruce Lee. I don't know how he ended up on the street, but his daughter alluded to an illness. It doesn't sound like his family rejected him, so I am not sure what his situation was. At one time the state could lock people like Tyrone in a mental hospital, but over the last 50 years laws have been passed to prevent the government from institutionalizing most of the mentally ill. In addition the courts say that the homeless can sleep on public land if there are no shelter beds for them.

The bottom line is that I do not know what the answer is. Interestingly enough I do see a direct correlation between the number of people who say that they are advocates for the homeless and the number of homeless.

I read a book on substance abuse and the author said that the first step is to get the person to want to change. The author went on to say, "You can lead a horse to water, but you cannot make him drink. However, you can make the horse very thirsty. A good therapist should be able to convince someone that their life would be better if they got off drugs." I feel it is the same with the homeless. *Read Rule 1.10, which just happens to be the one that we are focusing on this month.* But that is just my opinion. Let's start a conversation. Invitation to Serve on a New Youth Ministry Committee

We would like to form a committee to explore the creation of a SVdP High School ministry at Carondelet and De La Salle. This ministry would introduce the teens to the mission and works of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and grow the Vincentian family and a life-long love of serving the poor. We invite those who have a heart for working with teens and have had experience leading or volunteering with teens to join us on this committee. The committee will fine-tune a design and conduct outreach to Carondelet and De La Salle High schools to pilot a program in the Fall of 2022.

Initial thoughts for the program design, which would be open to Freshman, Sophomore, Junior and Senior students at Carondelet and De La Salle, would include activities such as:

- An orientation/invitation to serve to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's history and works
- Tour of the SVdP District Office and services offered, including the Loaves and Fishes Dining Room, RotaCare Free Medical Clinic, Dental Clinic, Workforce Development Program, Food Pantry, Store and Spiritual Activities
- Participation in monthly, hands-on service opportunities, including:
 - ➤ Volunteering at the Pleasant Hill, Pittsburg or Brentwood stores
 - ➤ Volunteering at the St. Francis, St. Mary's or St. Bonaventure's food pantries
 - Serving at the Gianni's Restaurant event and other SVdP events
 - ➤ Holding a High School Bundle Sunday
 - > Serving at/and or participating as a team in the Bocci Ball tournament
 - Participating in the Walk for the Poor
 - > Assisting with an Angel Tree program
 - Attending a conference meeting at an SVdP conference

And, if the pilot goes well, we could look at expanding the program to other youth groups.

Betty Ann McNeil, D.C.

Sister Betty Ann McNeil, a native of Virginia and a member of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, earned a baccalaureate degree in Social Welfare from Saint Joseph College, Emmitsburg, Maryland (1969) and a Master of Social Work from Virginia Commonwealth University (1975). Niagara University awarded her an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters (2019).

Sister Betty Ann served children, young mothers, immigrants, and refugees in a variety of social work roles prior to her appointment as Provincial Archivist for the Daughters of Charity, Province of Emmitsburg (1999).

Sister Betty Ann worked with the Advisory Committee for the publication of the multi-volume opus *Elizabeth Bayley Seton Collected Writings*, 3 vols. (New York City Press, 2000-2005), and with the DePaul University Vincentian Studies since 1988.

As an author on the Vincentian and Setonian tradition, Sister Betty Ann's work has been widely published; she has conducted workshops, retreats, etc. in North America, Europe, and Asia. Among her publications are the following:

- Author of 15 Days of Prayer with Elizabeth Seton (Liguori Publications: Liguori, MO, 2002).
- Co-author with Martha Libster, "Enlightened Charity: The Holistic Nursing Care, Education, and Advices Concerning the Sick of Sister Matilda Coskery, D.C., (1799–1870)" (Golden Apple Publications, 2009).
- Editor, update of the definitive Seton biography, Annabelle Melville, *Elizabeth Bayley Seton 1774-1821* (Sheridan Press, 2009).
- Editor, *Light & Grace, Elizabeth Seton on Life, Faith, and Eternity. Daily Reflections,* (Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph's: Emmitsburg, Maryland, 2009). An edition in Spanish, *Luz y Gracia*, is forthcoming.
- Compiler and Editor, Friendship of My Soul. Letters by Elizabeth Ann Seton. 1803-1809, (Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph's: Emmitsburg, Maryland, 2010).

Heart of a Friend—Elizabeth Ann Seton

Goal.

To present an overview of Elizabeth Bayley Seton, an American wife, mother, and convert to Catholicism, who embraced the Vincentian mission as a widow, and became a notable Vincentian woman and Saint as an educator, spiritual leader, and advocate for impoverished persons.

Objectives.

Participants will learn <u>about</u> Elizabeth Bayley Seton, learn <u>from</u> her response to life experiences, and be able to:

- 1. Give examples of events and circumstances when Elizabeth Bayley Seton made ethical choices, guided by Christian principles and Vincentian values.
- 2. Discuss how Elizabeth Seton handled her emotions and expressed her feelings as a woman in her many life roles.
- 3. Demonstrate how Elizabeth Seton nurtured healthy relationships with family, friends, and acquaintances, etc.
- 4. Explain how Elizabeth Seton and the Sisters of Charity contributed to the common good of the Church and society.
- 5. Illustrate how Elizabeth Seton understood God as Love, Beauty, Goodness, and Truth, allowing her spiritual life to mature and enrich the lives of others.
