Continuum of Care - Tackling Homelessness by Bob Liles



Those Vincentians that attended the Western Regional Meeting or the mid-year National Assembly saw a powerful presentation by Joe Sabatino. He showed how his District Council, in partnership with other non-profits and the local Continuum of Care program, were able to reduce the number of homeless in Charlotte County, Florida from 828 in 2011 to 169. I think we need to bring him to the Bay Area and work his magic.

Several years ago I was part of a county wide workshop on the homeless. We were all asked our vision of the homeless situation in five years. Many were very optimistic and wrote how there would be no homeless in five years. One of the county's homeless staff was probably the most realistic when she wrote that she was just hoping that in five years the number of people becoming homeless would

equal the number of people getting housed.

Unfortunately, due to the pandemic her view was very optimistic.

Steve Krank and I disagree on what Contra Costa County is capable of. I believe that due to the price of housing in the Bay Area that we cannot achieve what was achieved in Florida. Vincentians Transform lives

I was hired by the St. Vincent de Paul District Council in August of 2020. It hasn't quite been a year yet, but I am still completely floored by the work that gets done here by the hundreds of Vincentian volunteers throughout the county.

I was hired to help with communications and development work. I design flyers, I do social media posts, and I design newsletters such as this one. The main part of my job that has often left me speechless, however, is talking to the various people you Vincentians have helped through your compassion and dedication.

My office at the District Council has a window which looks out over the Free Dining Room we host in partnership with Loaves and Fishes of Contra Costa. Every single day I get to see the hungry get fed. Some come in their cars, some on bikes, but many of them arrive and leave on foot, and those feet are often unshod. They often do not have much, but the free dining room and the community it has spawned around itself provides them a sense of normalcy, dignity and friendship.

I was lucky enough to meet a homeless man named Pablo who came to the free dining room everyday. He is 62 years old, and has been living in his car for the last 3 years. Through a series of lunchtime interviews, I was able to not only learn Pablo's story - he did manual labor until his boss and friend lost his business, and finding manual labor work at his age has been difficult, but also to become his friend. Pablo and I have shared a number of talks and lunchtimes. With Steve Krank, and Thrift Store Manager Willie Moffett, Jr., we were able to help Pablo get a new pair of clothes and new shoes. He was really proud when he told me he was going to use them as his job-interview clothes.

Last week was the last time I saw Pablo at our free dining room. He was happy to tell me he had found a job, and showed me his interview shoes I helped him pick out. I've never had a job I can say that has been as fulfilling as working at SVdP. I just want to take the opportunity to thank all of you Vincentians for the hard work you do, and for allowing me to share in these stories of

transforming lives.


SVdP National Assembly - Houston, Texas

August 12th & 19th





Presenter Bio: Louise Sullivan, D.C., PhD



Louise Sullivan, D.C. is a Daughter of Charity of the Province of Saint Louise USA. She has spent her professional life and ministry mostly in education: elementary, secondary and university. She has a BS in French Education from St. Joseph College, a Masters in French Language and Literature from the Catholic University of America and a PhD from L'Université de Paris IV: Sorbonne. She was Professor of French Language and Literature and Chair of the Department of Foreign Languages at Niagara University.

During her 23 years there, in addition to teaching, she was closely involved with the NY State Association for Foreign Languages and the formation of future language teachers, giving talks, papers and workshops with the group.

During her time living in Paris, while studying at the Sorbonne, she became a translator for the international Company of the Daughters of Charity. From that grew her passion for Vincentian Studies. She would edit, translate and write numerous Vincentian works, such as "The Spiritual Writings of Louise de Marillac (the definitive English Language translation)," and "The Core Values of Vincentian Education," and she wrote the definitive biography of Bl. Rosalie Rendu, "Sister Rosalie Rendu: A Daughter of Charity on Fire with Love for the Poor," in The Vincentian Studies Institute monograph series.

In recognition of her work in Vincentian Studies, she was a recipient of The Perboyre Medal from Niagara University, The Pierre Coste Prize from De Paul University and an Honorary Doctorate from Saint John's University

Sr. Rosalie Rendu

Sister Rosalie Rendu, a member of the Daughters of Charity for 70 years, who worked within the confines of perhaps the poorest area of Paris, was buried with the trappings of a state funeral from the church of Saint-Medard on February 9th, 1856. The rich and poor joined the procession behind the crucifix leading her to her final resting place. Religious and government partisans forgot their differences for a few hours to pay tribute to this humble, yet remarkable woman. The mighty and the downtrodden wept together. The following day Parisian newspapers described the singular event and paid tribute to Sister Rosalie.

To this day, a steady flow of pilgrims visits her grave. Many leave flowers or small marble plaques expressing gratitude. These outpourings testify to the truth of the inscription on the tomb, "To our good mother Rosalie, her grateful friends, the poor and the rich." An avenue in Paris where she labored bears her name. Newspaper articles still recall her accomplishments.

On 21 August 1997, Pope John Paul II beatified Frederic Ozanam, the principal founder of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, at Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris. In his homily, the Holy Father evoked Sister Rosalie's name. He stated, "The bonds among the members of the Vincentian Family have been strong since the origin of the Society because it was a Daughter of Charity, Sister Rosalie Rendu, who guided Frederic Ozanam and his companions toward persons who were poor in the Mouffetard section of Paris."

But who exactly is this woman who was herself beatified on November 9th, 2003?

What does her life have to say to men and women of our era who seek to reach out to those in need?
