Recently a couple of the staff at the District Council received this email:

From: Bob Liles < officemail589233@gmail.com>

Greetings,

Hope you're doing well today? I have an assignment I need you to do for me immediately. Let me know if you are available.

Bob Liles President

And here is one that Claudia received earlier this year:

From: Bob Liles, Society of St Vincent de Paul Contra Costa County, 2210 Gladstone Dr, Pittsburg, CA. < churchonline012126@gmail.com>

Hello Claudia, do you have a moment? I have a request I need you to handle discreetly and quickly. I am going into a meeting now; no calls so just reply to my email.

Here's what I want you to do for me because I'm very busy right now. I have been working on incentives and I aimed at surprising our Administrative and Thrift store staff with gift cards this week. This should be very confidential, that is just between you and I alone, until they all have the gift cards as it's a surprise and you will also keep one for yourself too.

Can you do this? and how soon?

Unfortunately, neither emails were from me. They have also received phony emails supposedly from Claudia. I am sure that most of you are aware of this type of scam and are very

careful when you receive an email like this, but it is becoming harder and harder to tell the real from the phony. Sometimes you can tell it is a scam by double-checking the email address. In the two examples above, the email address is not correct. However, I have seen somewhere that the person could make it appear like it came from a valid email address and was even able to intercept emails sent back to the supposed sender. Sometimes there are links in the email that looks real, but when you click on them, they take you somewhere else. Some give a number to call if you have a question, but that also takes you down the wrong road. The bottom line is that if anything about an email doesn't look right or asks you to spend money, call the person directly or email them with a completely new email instead of hitting reply and double-check that the email address you are using is the correct one.

People requesting assistance are sometimes also scammers. One person sent me a forged letter from the housing authority. Another one could not wait for us to do the home visit with her, so she created a fake letter from us to her landlord that said we would pay her deposit. Unfortunately, he believed the letter and let her move in without confirming it was real.

Home Visits in the Vincentian Tradition

Unpublished work by Fr. Robert Maloney CM, "Home visits in the Vincentian Tradition," affirms the ongoing cultivation of the Vincentian heart through the home visit encounter.

Vincent de Paul insisted:

When you visit them, rejoice and say to yourself, "I am going to these poor people to honor in their person the person of Our Lord. I am going to see in them the Incarnate Wisdom of God." CCD: X:103.

A little history about home visits from Vincent's life.

Two by Two ... for 400 Years In 1617 when he founded the

Confraternities of Charity, Vincent directed members to go two by two to the homes of the sick and disadvantaged.

In 1625 when he founded the Congregation of the Mission, Vincent wrote: "We ... always go out two by two" during missions to visit the homes of the marginalized."

In 1633 when Vincent and Louise de Marillac founded the Daughters of Charity, He placed a significant emphasis on visits to the sick and poor. Such visits were among the most striking characteristics of this new community of sisters.

For September 2022, submission dates: Deadline 9/7/2022, Funding Meeting Date is 9/14/2022, Submission Date Deadline 9/21/2022 Funding Meeting Date 9/28/2022.

Please understand that submission is not a guarantee of funding. Hope Conference funding takes place only after a review of each case.

How has the support of the Hope Conference impacted our neighbors in need in the past five years? (Please note that the 2021-2022 data is through mid-August.) Here is a synopsis of the spiritual reflection that Kathy La Cross from Christ The King, Pleasant Hill, gave at this month's Conference meeting to kick off the month. Thank you, Kathy La Cross.

ST. LOUISE DE MARILLAC - Co-Foundress of the Daughters of Charity (1591-1660)

Born in France in 1591, Louise de Marillac was raised and educated by her widowed father, who passed away when she was 15. She was left in desperate social straits and felt the need to marry a gentleman named Antony Le Gras. It was a happy marriage, though regrets secretly plagued her that she had suppressed a religious vocation.

Her husband passed away while Louise was still young, and at that point, she looked for a sign of a vocation. It came as an introduction to Father Vincent de Paul, who became her spiritual director and guided her throughout the remainder of her life.

Father Vincent had organized an extraordinary range of charitable projects by the time they met. One included a circle of aristocratic ladies who worked together in the Parisian slums among the sick and destitute. Louise committed herself to this work but, over time, realized that the needs of the poor completely overwhelmed the part-time efforts of these well-intentioned women. She and Vincent formed the idea of a community of women wholly committed to service to the poor, and thus the Daughters of Charity was born.

The Daughters were not at first intended to be a religious congregation but a group that would work on the streets and in the hospitals and homes of the poor. Louise drew girls and widows from the lower classes and trained them in Paris. Their dress was the garb of peasant women. Their mantra was that the poor were their masters and that they would encounter the face of Christ in them. Whenever summoned by those in need, they would drop everything and serve.



The numbers and works of the Daughters expanded quickly, and soon their communities spread throughout France and other parts of Europe. They could be found administering hospitals, orphanages, and schools for the poor, as well as ministering to prisoners and galley enslaved people, visiting the poor in their squalid hovels, and caring for the victims of the plague.

The Daughters of Charity eventually was recognized by the Vatican as a religious congregation, with their members annually renewing vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Such recognition of a community of women living outside an enclosed convent and engaged in apostolic work in the world was a novel and remarkable achievement. Still, in her later

years, Louise worried about her group's future, afraid that the Sisters would lose touch with the radical spirit of service in the world and become "institutionalized" like so many other religious communities. So she would forever remind her Sisters to be "diligent in serving the poor....to love the poor, honor them.....as you would honor Christ Himself."

Louise died on March 15, 1660, at the age of 69. She was canonized in 1934 when the Sisters of Charity numbered more than 50,000 worldwide.
