

BOOK REVIEW – THE LEAST OF US by SAM QUINONES

Quinones gives the personal stories of people affected by fentanyl and meth. He jumps around between people, and it starts slow, but it draws you in and there are several big takes that I got from this book. He writes how the manufacturing process for meth has changed over the last five to ten years and it is now different due to impurities. The new meth messes with the brain a lot more than the old meth and makes the users paranoid and schizophrenic along with other mental disorders that may take years to recover from.

He postulates that the increase in homelessness is due to how the new meth is wrecking people's brains.

He also talked about how a judge changed his viewpoint on failed programs. In the case of drug rehab, the judge decided that failure is part of the nature of rehab. Just like quitting cigarettes or staying on a diet, it may take multiple failures before a program finally works with an addict. Unfortunately, the same is true for the people that we help. We are better equipped to help someone who had a string of bad luck and just needs to get out of hole. When someone has lived a life of making bad decisions, it is very hard in one home visit to change their lifestyle. Unfortunately, we have to make the hard decision on whether we have the time to hold that person's hand for the next year or to help others that are waiting for assistance and who might get right back on their feet after a little help.

Interesting excerpts from the book:

Decriminalizing drugs also removes the one lever we have to push men and women toward sobriety. Waiting around for them to decide to opt for treatment is the opposite of compassion when the drugs on the street are as cheap, prevalent, and deadly as they are today.

We used to believe that people needed to hit rock bottom before seeking treatment. That's another idea made obsolete by our addiction crisis and the current synthetic drug supply. It belongs to an era when drugs of choice were merciful. Nowadays people are living in tents, screaming at unseen demons, raped, pimped, beaten, un-showered, and unfed. That would seem to be rock bottom. Yet it's not enough to persuade people to get treatment. Today rock bottom is death.

We need to use arrests, but not as a reason to send someone to prison. Instead, criminal charges are leverage we can use to pry users from the dope that will consume them otherwise.

EXPIRATION DATES ON FOOD



Sometimes people donate food to pantries that are out of date. Do you have to throw it away? Not always. Obviously, if it is a bulging can or clearly rotten then it needs to be discarded. Here are some guidelines from an article in USA Today.

- The USDA says dates are not an indicator of product safety
- Only infant formula is required by federal law to be dated
- Find out what commonly used food phrases really mean (it's probably not what you think)

Grocery expiration labels can be intimidating, especially for dairy and <u>meats</u>. Manufacturers give their best guess as to when food will reach its peak quality with phrases like "best by," "use by" and "sell by."

But officially, the USDA says dates don't indicate product safety. Only <u>infant formula</u> is required by federal law to be dated. "Date labels usually indicate when food will be at its optimal freshness," said Nina Sevilla, program advocate for the food waste-fighting <u>Natural Resources Defense Council</u>. "If you have food a couple of days past that date, it likely means it's still OK to consume." To curb unnecessary waste, the NRDC is <u>calling for federal action</u> to standardize food date labels. Until then, here's how to decipher what you might find at the grocery store, plus how to press pause on ripening with your freezer.

What commonly used food phrases mean

- "Best if used by/before" When food is estimated to be at its best in terms of flavor or quality. It is not a safety date.
- "Sell by" this tells the store how long to display the product for sale for inventory management. It is not a safety date.
- "Use by" This is the last date recommended for the use of the product while at peak quality. It is not a safety date, except for when used on infant formula.
- "Freeze by" This indicates when a product should be frozen to maintain peak quality. It is not a safety date.

But some people don't want anything to do with food that is beyond its expiration date. But it is still best to not throw it away. One conference solved this problem by putting all food that was past its date in a separate box.

They put a sign on it that said something like this: FREE FOOD - TAKE ALL THAT YOU WANT IT IS PAST THE DATE STAMPED ON IT - BUT IT IS STILL SAFE TO EAT

Many people rejected it, but others grabbed all they could get. So, the ones fussy about the date got food they wanted and the others that don't care got extra food, and nothing had to be thrown away.

The Multifaith ACTION Coalition is partnering with Monument Impact and Healthy Contra Costa to offer free education, outreach, and pre-enrollment to help people across Contra Costa County access the CARES program. Outreach Coordinators from Monument Impact (Promotores) or Healthy Contra Costa (Community Health Advocates) are available to come to St Vincent de Paul food distribution events and set up an information table. The Outreach Coordinators not only provide information on CARES eligibility, but they can also pre-enroll people into the program and help them to pull together the necessary documents to ensure successful enrollment into CARES.

SVdP of CONTRA COSTA COUNTY IS GOING STRONG AND GROWING STRONGER

The last few months at St. Vincent de Paul of Contra Costa County (SVdP), have been really fulfilling for me and a testament to the power of the Vincentian calling.

In late January, I was privileged to attend a commissioning and recommissioning celebration for the Vincentians of the conference at St. Joan of Arc. More than 20 Vincentians were commissioned and at least that many were recommissioned. There was also a special recognition of John Talliac, and 50-year+ Vincentian at both St. Joan of Arc and the Hope Conferences and Ed McMillan, former Stores Committee chair and leader of the Toolbelt Brigade! It was a joy to be a part of the fellowship that followed, breaking bread, sharing stories and getting to know some of the new Vincentians.

On February 25, I had the opportunity to learn with 51 other Vincentians at a Home Visit Workshop hosted by our Conference at St. Anthony in Oakley. Fellow participants included Vincentians who had just attended their first Ozanam Orientation a few weeks prior at Queen of All Saints as well as veteran Vincentians who wanted to hone their skills after being away from making home visits in the past few years. Some conferences are just starting to make home visits again, and the excitement to be with our neighbors where they live and walk their journey with them was notable.

In order to keep supporting the zeal of our Vincentians, we have secured funding for two part-time positions of Vincentian Support Associates. These two staff members would help Stephen Krank, Vincentian Services Manager, support our conferences. One would be focused on East County conferences and the other on West County conferences. We are hoping to fill these positions with bilingual candidates (Spanish and English) to better serve our neighbors and support our Spanish-speaking Vincentians, particularly in our Spanish-speaking conferences. CATHOLIC FUNERAL & CEMETERY SERVICES




Each week since our Free Medical Clinic began and we began to partner with RotaCare of the Bay Area, we host a meal for our volunteer Nurses, Interpreters, Doctors, PAs, and Staff that provide free medical care here at the St. Vincent de Paul Family Resource Center. As the Medical Clinic and services have grown, thankfully, so have the number of Conferences and individual volunteers wanting to participate in providing the meals.

Currently, we can cover all but the fourth Wednesday of each month, which is the reason for every year; I appeal for Conferences willing to participate by preparing the meal for the twenty volunteers and bringing it to the Family Resource Center or sponsoring the purchase for the Volunteers.

Last year we had the privilege of adding Free Dental Care for our neighbors in need. Through a partnership with Dentist on Wheels, we are now providing care each month for the same number of patients we were able to care for each year. The scope of the care has moved from our first focus, "the elimination of pain," to preserving the existing teeth and oral health care. The quality of care has created a backlog that fluctuates from 300 + to 400 applications on our waiting list. Again, all our Dentists, Oral Hygienists in partnership with Dentist on Wheels, are volunteers, with the Clinics taking place every Wednesday and Thursday.

We want to offer the same for the Volunteer staff and Dentists lunches twice a week. We have ten volunteer staff each day the Free Dental Clinic is open. (Includes the Dentists, Oral hygienists, and Dental Assistants).

If you are willing to support the Clinic dinner on the fourth Friday of a month for twenty volunteers (each of next 12 upcoming months are open) or can provide the Dental Clinic volunteers a lunch ten volunteers once each month, or once in 12 months contact Stephen Krank. s.krank@svdp-cc.org


