

Ready Kids East County



First 5 Contra Costa partners with organizations in East County on a multi-layered effort to reform the systems and services available to African American and Black families with children under 5 with an emphasis on school readiness.

The effort includes working to enhance the capacity of early childhood systems, enhancing the skills and awareness of service providers, and empowering parents and caregivers to be change agents. The Dean & Margaret Lesher Foundation is a funding partner of this effort.

Many factors impact kindergarten readiness.

In order to succeed in school, career, and life, young children must be fully supported and prepared to begin kindergarten. A child's wellbeing is one of the best predictors for whether or not they'll be ready for kindergarten. Studies show that economic, food, and housing security, as well as health and wellness, resiliency in the face of trauma and adversity, and access to resources are inextricably linked to a child's wellbeing, and therefore how ready they are for school.

Not all children have the same resources to support their readiness for school. Our 2017 study of kindergarten readiness in Contra Costa¹ surfaced the racial disparities in school readiness between Black and other children, with some of the deepest disparities countywide in Pittsburg.

It takes a village.

It takes a village to get our children ready for school, and even more so to transform years of under-investment, racist policies, and systemic oppression. That's why Ready Kids East County takes an ecological approach and works on multiple layers of community change:

- · Empowering parents and caregivers
- Offering learning opportunities to service providers and educators
- Expanding African American/Black-focused programming
- Exploring changes to policies, practices and approaches within our communities and organizations



Supporting Families with Family Resource Centers in Contra Costa County



Recent research underscores the critical role positive parentchild relationships and healthy family dynamics have on children both during their early years and throughout their lives. In addition, our health, education and social service systems are fragmented and overburdened. Families struggle to navigate each system's jargon, eligibility requirements, and services. Many public systems are under constraints that make it difficult to take a "whole child" or "whole family approach." Yet research shows that young children need all of these elements present to maximize their development and prevent negative health and education outcomes and even child abuse.

First 5 Contra Costa's family resource centers, called First 5 Centers, help families' access the information and services needed to help their children thrive.

Two Decades of Experience **Building Families' Capacity**


First 5 Contra Costa has worked hand in hand with communities to continually refine the First 5 Center model for more than two decades. Unlike other community centers, First 5 Centers are designed to holistically support families with children ages 0 to 5. The centers use evidence-based prevention strategies that enhance parents' understanding of child development, positive parenting techniques, school readiness, and self advocacy, while also building a sense of community and ownership in the program among participants.

The centers collectively serve almost 3,000 parents and their children from across the county each year. The centers offer group classes for parents as well as for parents with their children, playgroups, school readiness activities, support groups, one-onone assistance connecting to other services, and give-aways such as food and diapers - all for free for any family interested.

Connecting Families to Other Systems to Meet Their Needs

Based on two decades of experience, First 5 Centers added staff dedicated to providing families one-on-one consultations to refer them to other services in the community based on their needs. Since adding this service in 2009, the First 5 Centers have been providing this service to more parents each year:



347 parents in FY 2020



391 parents in FY 2021



412 parents in FY 2022

The vast majority of the parents benefiting from these consultations are Black, indigenous, and people of color, and parents who speak languages other than just English.



More Families Seeking Support While Funding for Centers is Diminishing

First 5 has conducted several needs assessments over the years to gauge the communities with the highest unmet needs and what services they need most. The current center locations and array of services were determined by community need. Our latest assessments indicate there are still many families with unmet needs in the county and a demand for more hours, staff, and expanded reach of the First 5 centers, particularly in areas where few nonprofits or county services exist. In addition, First 5 Contra Costa's main funding source, state tobacco tax, is declining rapidly, threatening the sustainability of the First 5 Centers. First 5 Contra Costa is seeking new funding sources to help sustain current centers and expand services throughout the county.

Every year, more parents share with First 5 that they need help parenting, understanding if their child is on track with their development, connecting with services, and surviving life's challenges. The data below summarizes data from an annual survey First 5 Centers give to parents before they register with the center.

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Enhancing Early Intervention for Contra Costa's Young Children



All children deserve to reach their full potential.

First 5 Contra Costa's Early Intervention efforts ensure that families have access to prevention and early intervention supports that foster the optimal development of all children.

Regular, evidence-based screenings can change the trajectory for children. Early identification of developmental delays, behavioral concerns, and other needs related to trauma help children access services during the critical years of their development. The earlier interventions begin, the more likely they are to be effective and the greater the chance a child has of reaching their full potential. Research has also shown intervening early enhances family functioning and resiliency, and can save significant taxpayer dollars that would otherwise be needed to address untreated issues later in life.

First 5 Contra Costa builds the capacity of the professionals and the systems they work within to adopt proven prevention and early intervention approaches. Many providers working with young families are stretched thin with large caseloads of families with multiple needs.

First 5 Contra Costa works across public and private sectors to bring training to providers, resources to pilot new approaches, and best practices to institutionalize proven methods.

Promoting trauma-informed and resiliency practices.

One of the most potentially damaging factors in a child's development is the effect of trauma and toxic stress, which can lead to children facing lifelong physical, behavioral and emotional challenges. The effects of toxic stress are detectable as early as infancy and can be associated with failure to thrive, growth delays, sleep disruption, and developmental delays.

First 5 Contra Costa works with public and private healthcare providers to build their capacity to screen, treat and heal toxic stress. Using a family-centered approach, First 5 Contra Costa created the Network of Care that helps build connections between health and social service providers to ensure all aspects of families' needs are met with trauma-informed practices that bolster families' resiliency.

First 5 Contra Costa is working to ensure that all health providers in our county have the knowledge and systems to screen all children for Adverse Childhood Experiences at least once before they are age 5, and that healthcare providers can successfully refer families to the health or social services needed to heal.

Developmental Screenings

To help children ages birth to 5 in Contra Costa County achieve their best development, the Help Me Grow program ensures children have regular developmental screenings and get connected to services they need. Evidence-based developmental screenings help identify developmental delays and behavioral concerns that if left untreated can result in poor academic and health outcomes for children as they age.

The program works with a variety of agencies and families throughout the county to increase awareness of the importance of early identification and intervention, and enhance the way families are referred to support services. Families, medical staff, and social service providers can access a Help Me Grow hotline to speak to staff dedicated to helping families access screenings and services to support families' needs.





Working to Support Families and Address Mental Health Services Crisis

Contra Costa County has a severe shortage of mental health services to meet families' needs, which have only increased since the pandemic. Parents accessing services funded by First 5 Contra Costa continue to identify their child's development and behavior as one of their top concerns, above paying bills and making ends meet. For example as highlighted in this table, 15% of parents reported their child's development and behavior was their biggest concern.

First 5 Contra Costa works with other partners to call attention to these unmet mental health needs and to strategize ways to access new and leverage existing resources to serve those families with the most critical needs.




Vision:

While the early period in children's development is critical to their future success, it is also where public investments are lowest. Research shows that early childhood programs have some of the highest returns on investment of social service programs.

At First 5 Contra Costa, we prioritize our efforts and investments to focus on eliminating disparities and creating equitable opportunities and outcomes.



Quality early learning programs impact children's future.

Our **Early Childhood Education** efforts help ensure children have high-quality early learning experiences that help them succeed in school and in life.

Interactions with children during their first 5 years makes a difference in their future learning, behavior, and health. Nurturing, supportive relationships impact children's academic and emotional well-being in the short and long-term.

First 5 Contra Costa offers professional development opportunities for early learning educators, supports continuous program quality improvement, and promotes policies and supports to foster school readiness and a stable early learning educator workforce.

Regular, evidence-based screenings that lead to connecting families to needed services can change children's developmental trajectory. Research shows prevention and early intervention can not only improve lifelong outcomes for children, but also yield long-term economic benefits.

First 5 Contra Costa builds the capacity of professionals and the systems they work within to adopt proven prevention and early intervention approaches, including developmental screenings and strategies to address toxic stress and Adverse Childhood Experiences.



Thriving families lead to thriving children.

Our **Strengthening Families** efforts help families access the information and services needed to help their children thrive.

Increasing parents' and caregivers' understanding of child development and parenting can lead to better child and family outcomes.

First 5 Contra Costa connects families to resources and programs that focus on strengthening families' abilities to foster children's health and development, including supporting five family resource centers, parenting classes, and distributing kits to new parents.



First 5 Contra Costa works to ensure young children are healthy, ready to learn, and supported in safe, nurturing families and communities. We invest in policies, programs, and capacity building to change systems that support families and children during their first five years—the most important time in children's development.



Early Childhood and Education Crisis in Contra Costa County



Every child deserves access to quality early childhood education.

Research shows all children, and particularly children from lower income families, benefit from high-quality early learning programs in which children have meaningful interactions with qualified staff who are culturally and linguistically responsive. Children who attend high-quality early childhood education programs are more likely to be ready to learn when they enter kindergarten. First 5 Contra Costa works with other organizations in the county to increase families' access to such high-quality early childhood education programs, and to ensure staff in those programs have the supports they need to foster children's optimal development.

The early childhood education landscape in Contra Costa County faced many challenges before the pandemic occurred. As with many other regions of the country, the Covid-19 pandemic intensified those challenges and created even more pressure on a field already struggling to keep up demand and sustain a qualified workforce.

Even Harder for Families to Find the Child Care They Need

Contra Costa is one of the fastest growing counties in the Bay Area, with approximately 75,000 children under the age of 6. Economic stability for families in our county varies greatly depending on the location, and in 22 of the county's census tracts between 25-49% of households with children under age 6 live in deep poverty.

Far too many of our county's low-income working families cannot access the quality child care they need. An estimated 19,400 children under the age of 5 eligible for subsidized care cannot access spaces due to our county's low supply. This translates to about 90% of children under the age of 3 who were eligible in 2022 without a program to enroll in, and similarly 60% of eligible 3 and 4 years old not able to enroll.

The shortage of subsidized child care to meet the needs in our county is exasperated by the insufficient reimbursement rates paid by the state system. Many subsidized programs have staff vacancies because their state funding is not enough to retain or attract qualified staff. In our county's Head Start program alone, more than 40 classrooms were closed impacting 450 children in May 2022 due to staffing shortages. In addition to the low state reimbursement rates, the pandemic and related economic impacts have had large impacts across the child care field in our county. In FY 2021 alone, there were about 90 child care providers (including both those who serve subsidized children and those who do not) who closed, resulting in approximately 2,000 fewer children being served.

Lower Compensation Continues to Threaten the ECE Workforce

Recent data from the UC Berkeley Center for the Study of Child Care Employment shows that early childhood education staff in the Bay Area continue to make less than comparable staff in TK-12 school districts. On average, center-based teachers earn \$6,300 less in annual pay while family child care teachers earn \$16,500 less than their TK-12 counterparts.

Many early childhood education providers are dedicated to their work despite the lack of compensation and recognition. The UC Berkeley Center's work documents how hard early childhood education staff try to make ends meet so they can continue working with young children—they work second jobs, take on debt, seek safety net services like Cal Fresh or other forms of assistance. For many, this is not sustainable, no matter how committed they are to caring for and educating children. As transitional kindergarten expands in California, many early childhood education teachers are drawn to the stability, benefits, and higher pay of the TK-12 system.

First 5 Contra Costa is partnering with public and private agencies to introduce possible solutions to the county's early childhood education workforce crisis, including exploring solutions such as guaranteed income pilots or teacher stipends to reach TK-12 parity.







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
