**BOOK REVIEW** – The Complete "Imitation of Christ" by Thomas Kempis. *Translation by Fr. John-Julian* 

I don't understand why it took me so long to finally read this book. After all it has been read more than any book other than the Bible. Of the four books that make it up, I found the first two to be the best.

I could not read more than two pages at one sitting since there was just so much packed into every sentence. In fact I'll have to go back in several months and reread it in the hope that more of it sinks in. It gets into very specific detail on how you should be living your life and sets a high standard.

I got the version in which the translator has a page of comments for every page that Thomas Kempis wrote. In some cases it adds nothing, but many times it makes the original text more clear.

At our Day of Reflection on January 27<sup>th</sup>, Tim Williams told everyone what a great book it was and how St. Vincent de Paul encouraged everyone to read it.

## **Rule 3.14 THE USE OF MONEY AND PROPERTY FOR THE POOR**

Vincentians should always remember that giving love, talents, and time is more important than giving money. Nevertheless, the Society uses money and property to help relieve the suffering of those in need. The Society's funds must be handled with the utmost care, prudence, and generosity. Money must not be hoarded. Decisions regarding the use of money and property are to be made after reflection in the light of the Gospel and Vincentian principles.



Accurate records of all money received or spent must be kept. The Society may not allot funds to other organizations, except occasionally for other branches of the Vincentian Family, save under exceptional circumstances.



## **SVdP St Callistus Conference**

Through rain, fog, wind, sunshine, and COVID, our dedicated Vincentians and volunteers never stopped serving our "Neighbors in Need" with our twice a week food distribution from our pantry.

The food is set up like a farmer's market in St. Callistus'

courtyard; unless it rains, we enter the church's hall. Our volunteers are diverse and represent our community. They range in age from 12 to 85 years old. We assist our Neighbors in Need with volunteers who speak English, Tagalog, Spanish, French, Dutch, and Vietnamese.

Since the beginning of Covid, the number of families we provide for has gone from 100

per week to over 250 a week. We have regulars who have come for years, but we are getting many more first-timers from other countries.

The Food Bank of C.C. and Solano County is our primary source of food donated either from them directly or their connections with stores.

Someone dropped off a bag of used clothes one day. So, we decided to put a table out with the donations. Months later, we get clothes, household items, and toy donations. We have nicknamed our addition *SVDP FREE FOR ALL BOUTIQUE*.

After our Neighbors get their food, we let them look through our Boutique, with the ability to choose an item. The rapport and bond we make with the folks is truly heartwarming. Smiles and hugs are free, as well as all the food and extras. We are blessed.

## Dear Vincentian Friends of St. Vincent de Paul,

The past three years have been an incredible journey for Dentists on Wheels, serving the less fortunate communities in Contra Costa County.

What began with just two volunteer dentists during our pilot program has blossomed into a team of over 30 dedicated volunteers. It is hard to put a value on their time generously given, but the state of California would estimate it at over \$303,000, all provided at no cost to us.

Since 2021, we've treated over 200 patients, with our dentists traveling from various cities across California, including one from Los Angeles, to lend their expertise.

In 2023 alone, during our 50 days of operation, we provided approximately \$490,000 worth of free dental work to our patients (our Vincentian neighbors), all without receiving any funds from insurance companies. Each patient receives between \$6,000 and \$9,000 of dental treatment at no charge.

All of our volunteers take immense pride in our Free Dental Clinic, offering complimentary dental care to those in need and providing comprehensive treatment. When patients come to us in severe pain, we address their dental needs, restoring their oral health, not just the immediate issue causing discomfort. We approach each patient with compassion, without judgment, and strive to



make their experience as comfortable as possible. Their gratitude is evident in the testimonials we receive, with many expressing appreciation for our genuine care and pain-free treatment.

For many of our patients referred from the St. Vincent de Paul Conferences, visiting the dentist was a luxury they couldn't afford for years due to financial constraints or lack of insurance. Some have shared stories of how their dental issues impacted their ability to secure employment or affected their daily lives, including difficulties with eating and homelessness. These firsthand accounts underscore our partnership's vital role in providing essential dental care to those who need it the most.

Operating within St. Vincent de Paul, a trusted community hub, ensures our patients feel welcomed and supported. They know we have their best interests at heart when they walk through our doors without ulterior motives.

The need for our services has always been apparent, but until now, it has yet to be addressed. We consider ourselves fortunate to partner with our Vincentians throughout the County and St. Vincent de Paul in fulfilling our mission of providing free, comprehensive, restorative dental services and oral health education to the underserved and uninsured communities in and around Contra Costa County. *We will have more information on how Conferences can access this terrific resource for the neighbors in need in the April edition of the Vetera Monimenta.*

## Empowering Our Community: St. Paul Conference's Endeavors Notes from the St. Paul Conference

At the St. Paul Conference, we are excited to share updates on our recent initiatives to enhance our community's well-being. Recently, we have been fortunate to acquire a valuable asset—a container formerly belonging to St. Vincent de Paul—which has found a new home at Mary's House, situated conveniently at the back of our building.

This acquisition proved timely, especially during our recent engagement with the food bank on February 25th. Thanks to this addition, we now boast 1 1/2 refrigeration units and a small freezer, which have proven invaluable for storing and distributing fresh produce and occasional meat donations from our partner conferences.

In addition to food items, we've also received generous donations, including over 20 cases of diapers and 100 warm pizzas, all of which have been distributed to our neighbors in need. The container has swiftly transitioned into a hub for storage and distribution, efficiently supporting our efforts to serve the community.



We're eagerly awaiting feedback from the Food Bank,

with Robert Gama expressing satisfaction with our service delivery during his recent visit. Approval for our application is pending, and we remain optimistic about the outcome.



We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all who have supported us, including your office and fellow conferences, whose contributions have bolstered our mission. Your generosity enables us to continue serving our low-income families here in San Pablo.

As we move forward, we remain committed to the values of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, seeking God's blessings to guide us in our endeavor to serve others with love.

**Special Note:** The Conference at St. Paul continues to grow to fill the void created by the closing of St. David's Pantry at St. Mark. They need a van with seats that could be removed that will help them facilitate the pick-up of the food from the Food Bank in the future and the growing list of donors they have been able to find to support their Conferences work. ## Vincentians of Contra Costa County Are Not Alone in Our Suffering

Each month, Vincentian staff from all over the country join together on Zoom to talk about best practices, struggles, and challenges in serving the Councils and Conferences, and how to best support our Vincentians and neighbors in need. In the last two or three Vincentian Support/Life Meetings a theme ran through our meetings: An increase in the number of neighbors in need, and a post-pandemic decrease in the number of active Vincentians, and Conferences throughout the country who are able and willing to help. Collectively, we landed on this guidance from an excerpt from Our Serving in Hope Module VII, Page 53: Maintaining a constant prayerful discernment to balance enabling vs empowering charitable love.

From the Vincentian perspective, we always begin by providing prayers, understanding, information, and care. We avoid the reduction of our ministry of "serving" only to giving financial or material assistance. The greatest gift we can offer our neighbors is the gift of our time in an ongoing relationship.

Suggestions:

- We pray to receive God's wisdom and Christ's love in performing our Vincentian work. Mass, the Sacraments, and reading the Scriptures are essential. We gather together in our Conference meetings in thoughtful discernment and prayer regularly. Vincentians must be contemplatives in action.
- We commit to spending more time, over time, with our neighbors, making follow-up visits, and learning how to mentor.
- We endeavor to listen deeply and sensitively to underlying problems and root causes.
- We keep abreast of the many services and resource-building programs available in our community for persons in need. This was the hallmark of the Society in Frédéric Ozanam's time and is still true today in the 21st" Century.

Vincentians are aware of different types of poverty and tailor their sharing of resources and services available in the community to their individual neighbors.

Service provided for recurrent or problem cases can sometimes be used as an incentive to move some individuals, who are ambivalent about seeking outside help, to address and take action to solve their problems. Help in such situations would be given contingent upon following through on sincere, well-thought-out plans created by the neighbor and home visit teams or their mentor with consultation and coaching by other Vincentians and community partners.

We strive to create a loving and compassionate impression with a family and leave them with the feeling that we care for them, even though we may not give them all the material or financial help they requested. Follow-up visits reinforce our commitment. Your presence in a home can give hope and help heal wounds we don't even know about. It is just something to think about.

## Youth in our County Unite to Form a Conference

We were privileged to have a dedicated group of teens from St. Joan of Arc Parish visit the Family Resource Center on a recent rainy Saturday morning. They are part of a group of enthusiastic teens who are forming a Youth Conference of SVdP at St. Joan of Arc. These young people, guided by some wonderful adult leaders and supported by Conference president Frank Wnuk and other Vincentians, came to learn more about Vincentian Life and how we serve our neighbors in need.

They participated in our Shower program, a joint effort of The Bay Church, New Destiny Church, the City of Pittsburg, Loaves and Fishes of Contra Costa, and SVdP, as well as at the Saturday food distribution held by the SVdP Conference at the Church of the Good Shepherd.

It was truly

heartwarming to see these young people really engage in the work they were doing and, especially, interact with our neighbors in need.

They are recruiting new members and will be commissioned as new Youth Vincentians on Ozanam Sunday. Please keep them in your prayers for a successful launch of this new program!


