CONFERENCE MEETINGS Spiritual reading or meditation

The Spiritual Advisor should read something and **allow the members to comment** as a means of sharing their faith. This should last at least 10-15 minutes and is the most important part of the meeting. If you feel that your conference cannot spend that much time on this due to other important business, then your conference is not properly prioritizing its business, and some business should be done outside the meeting.

When Mother Teresa was asked by her assistants to reduce her time in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament from one hour a day to 30 minutes so that she could personally meet with more people, she increased her devotion to two hours a day.
