

On May 17 and 18 about 130 Vincentians from the West Region met in Sacramento. While there were many workshops the main focus was the National President, John Berry, introducing his "Vision SVdP...Every Voice Matters" program. After a 75 minute talk the attendees split into groups of about six.

The groups went around their table and let each person say things that they liked about the Society and things that they would like changed. Everyone was told to just make a simple statement and not explain why they felt that way. One person at the table wrote down all of the comments. No one was allowed to speak until it was their turn, other than to ask the speaker to clarify what they were saying. John points out that the Rule says that the Society must change how it helps the poor as society itself changes.

Some things will never change, like the Society being a Catholic lay organization, but other things may change. At the June District Council meeting the presidents were trained on how to do this. Every conference should hold a listening session either at their conference meeting or at a special meeting. All of the results will be rolled up to National and, somehow, they are going to categorize them and decide where the Society will go from here. Each conference needs to scan in the written comments and email them to National and to Steve Krank.

They also need to mail the originals to National. Deadline is December, but please get it done before summer is over.

WR Highlights cont.

Here are my thoughts on this. About forty years ago my younger brother quit his job and announced that he had a calling to become a monk. After a year of visiting various monasteries across the country I asked him what his plan was. He said that he recently received a letter from an abbot of a community that he had visited. He had mailed the abbot a ten-page dissertation on how the monastery was no longer following all of the rules that the saint that founded it in the 13th century had written down. The abbot politely explained to my brother that it was no longer the 13th century and they firmly believe that if their patron saint was alive today that he would be happy with the changes that they have made. So change has to happen. On the other hand, some national organizations, like the Boy Scouts, have changed a lot of their foundational premises and are now spiraling down at an even faster pace. So changes must be made very carefully. You will get your chance to voice your thoughts at an upcoming conference meeting.

LENTEN PIGGY BANK DRIVE By Pat and Dara Walsh - Discussed during the August 5th Special Works Training

St. Anthony Conference is blessed with a core group of Vincentians who work tirelessly to serve neighbors in need in our community. With both a robust food pantry and a group of Vincentians conducting home visits throughout the year, we do our best to leverage funding opportunities to support our mission. We are also blessed with an abundance of support from our parish. Our priest, Father Rafael Hinojosa, is a staunch supporter of our ministry and graciously provides us with funds by designating the 2nd collection every 5th Sunday of the month for our conference. In addition, our largest fundraiser is our annual Lenten Piggy Bank Drive. Here is how it works.

We purchased hundreds of piggy banks from a promotional company and had our logo and conference information imprinted on them. Our initial expense was over \$600. We number the piggies on their snouts with a permanent marker. The piggies look like this:



To kick off the event, we speak to our parishioners from the ambo during the announcements at every Mass the week before the beginning of Lent. We also publish an announcement in the bulletin and on our parish website. Then, on the first Sunday after Ash Wednesday, we hand out piggies after every Mass. We ask parishioners to print their names, phone numbers, and the number on the pig's snout on a form. To keep things moving, we use several clipboards so that we can hand out multiple piggies at the same time. We ask parishioners to return them at Easter.

On Easter, we stand outside the church and say, "Thank you!" as people return them. Most people forget. We also

collect piggies the week after Easter. In addition, we build a locking pig pen and place it in the vestibule. People drop off piggies at their convenience, and we empty the pig pen daily.

In late May or early June, we hold a piggy party, where we empty the contents of the piggy banks into thick plastic bags provided to us by our bank. We then take the money to the bank. The bills and checks are deposited into our account at that time. The bank sends the coins to their main facility in San Francisco, where they are counted by machine for us. Since we are a 501(c)3, our bank provides these services free of charge. (It is helpful that one of our Vincentians is an assistant manager at the bank).

Last year, our gross proceeds totaled over \$16,000. We use these funds to provide food and emergency assistance to our neighbors in need. Our parish community embraces our ministry and is confident in us and our work. God is good! We are happy to serve. The Relic of St. Louise de Marillac (From SVDP- Contra Costa 60th Anniversary)

On the altar at the 60th Anniversary, Mass were relics of St. Vincent de Paul and St. Louise de Marillac. How appropriate to have them together, since in life they worked so closely together. The relic of St. Vincent is owned by a parishioner of St. Catherine's Church in Martinez. The one of St. Louise was donated to the District Council in April of this year by Vincentian Terry O'Meara. She received the small bone fragment from her mother, who received it from Bishop Glass around 1915. In 1897 Joseph S. Glass was ordained to the Vincentian Order (Congregation of the Mission). Later he became the president of St. Vincent's College in Los Angeles. Terry's mother was his cousin and his secretary at the

college. The college was shut down in 1915 and at that time he was named the second bishop of Salt Lake City. He died in 1926, before Terry was born.

There are a lot of fake relics. It is said that if every piece of wood that is claimed to be part of the cross that Christ died on was weighed, the cross would have weighed two tons. The relic of St. Vincent has papers of authenticity. The relic of St. Louise does not. Here are the church's guidelines for veneration of relics:

Ordinarily, a relic exposed for public veneration is authenticated by a cardinal or bishop or other delegated person. This appears to no longer be a strict requirement of canon law as it used to be, but it is still the case that the Church requires that relics publicly venerated be authentic, and authentication by some prelate is still the normal way of proceeding. By "authentic" is meant that, humanly speaking, the relic comes from credible sources. This does not mean there is strict certainty about the relic but only prudent, human confidence. In the veneration of very ancient relics, their antiquity and identity throughout time provides a credible witness.

Prior to the Mass Bishop Barber was shown the relic and was told that we had a handwritten letter by Bishop Glass which told Terry's mother to take good care of the relic. The Bishop said that was sufficient for him.

Here is short extract from an article on why Catholics venerate relics:

It's not uncommon for many people to honor the memory of their loved ones by keeping pictures of family around the house. Nor is it uncommon to keep cherished belongings of our deceased loved ones, like grandma's jewelry or grandpa's Bible. These belongings likely are treasured, and treated with honor and reverence. They're kept in safe and honorable places.

We should understand that relics are meant to be honored and venerated, not worshipped. In fact, the saints lead us to fuller worship of God in spirit and truth. By honoring their memories, bodies and belongings, we give thanks to God for the saint's holy witness. Relics are physical, tangible, concrete reminders that heaven is obtainable for us — so long as we recognize what made the saints holy and work to apply those qualities to our lives. When venerating relics we express gratitude to God for those members of our spiritual family. In the presence of the relics we recall their holy lives and we pray for the grace to achieve what they've achieved — eternity with God in Heaven.




