STRONGER TOGETHER: WORKING IN UNITY FOR OUR NEIGHBORS By Donna Walton

All Vincentians understand that the work we do is not easy. To effectively serve our neighbors in need, grow spiritually, and strengthen our friendships, it is essential that our Conferences collaborate. In Concord, the four Conferences initially operated somewhat independently. However, as requests from all areas of Concord increased, particularly due to our 211 listing, the presidents of the four Conferences began to connect.

We started coordinating efforts—sharing home visits, pooling financial resources, and communicating about food pantry schedules. We also exchanged experiences, challenges, and successes. Our meetings, both formal and informal, have brought us closer. We've developed processes for handling home visits, twinning, and co-pays, while strengthening our friendships through casual lunches.

Now, St. Francis, Queen of All Saints, St. Bonaventure, and St. Agnes work as one, unified team, better equipped to serve the people of Concord. **Together, we are stronger.**



RULE 4.2 Emergency Assistance

When disasters, war or major accidents occur, the Society launches emergency initiatives on the spot and provides funds for the local Society to help victims.



MEETING AGENDA - HOME VISITATION REPORT


A report is presented on all individuals and families visited during the week, regardless of where the visit occurred. The Conference must decide whether to offer assistance during the meeting. If so, all relevant details of each case should be provided. This approach is most effective for Conferences that meet weekly.

If decisions are made outside the meeting, the report should focus on noteworthy visits that were particularly challenging, provided new insights, or had a profound spiritual impact. The report should remain concise. After the initial visit, the report should include all relevant details about the individual or family, with future updates only noting significant changes. The visiting members should then recommend any further action, and the Conference may discuss and decide on any issues or next steps.

Reports on hospital visits, institutions, or Special Works should be similarly brief, including any recommendations for future action. Finally, it is essential—both for practical reasons and as required by our Rule—that these "visits are always conducted in pairs".

RETAINING YOUR MEMBERS – PART ONE

Progress requires time, effort, and patience. Once you've built a strong foundation, retaining members is crucial to maintaining growth and impact. Retain people by helping them engage in meaningful, fulfilling work. A dedicated member understands their role and its importance.

New Members

New members are like diamonds in the rough. Retain them by:

- 1. Assigning a Mentor Match them with an experienced Vincentian for at least 4-6 months.
- 2. Giving Immediate Tasks Start with simple tasks, explaining their importance.

- 3. Providing Responsibility Involve them in significant activities like home visits.
- 4. Training Offer training for specialized roles and team them with experienced members.
- 5. Ozanam Orientation Enroll them in the Orientation within three months, ensuring they go with a familiar person.
- 6. Building Fellowship Integrate them into the larger Vincentian community through events and carpools.
- 7. Welcoming Non-Catholics Embrace all who share the Society's values, fostering ecumenism.

Existing Members

Keep existing members engaged, as they are vital for mentorship and experience. Ensure they feel needed and informed. Assign them to committees, such as:

- Information & Referral
- Food Procurement
- Spirituality
- Social Events
- Communications

Encourage continuous learning through workshops, retreats, and training, such as the Ozanam Orientation, Serving in Hope modules, and advocacy through Voice of the Poor. Understand that life changes may require members to step back. A positive exit increases the chance they will return or support you in other ways.

2024-25 Officer Training: Organizing for Greater Impact – October 26th



What does it take to truly help our neighbors in need? Our Patron, St. Vincent de Paul, once reminded us that, "The poor suffer less from a lack of generosity than from a lack of organization."

And our co-founder, Blessed Frédéric Ozanam, echoed this with passion: "The saints were out of their minds when it came to love. Their love was limitless, embracing God, humanity, and nature. [...] My dear friend, are we not going to do anything to become like those saints whom we love?" Indeed, to make a lasting impact in the lives of those we serve, it takes work—and it

takes Christ's call to organize our efforts for greater effectiveness.

We invite you to the 2024-25 Officer Training, where we will explore how we can better organize our service for maximum impact. This training will include three key sessions:

- 1. For Conference Presidents, Vice Presidents, and Spiritual Advisors

 How can we balance the spiritual development of our members, our role as Servant
 Leaders, and the outgrowth of efficacious service as we meet the poor, one neighbor at a
 time?
- 2. Back to Basics for Treasurers, Assistant Treasurers, and New Treasurers
 This session will focus on our dual role as advocates for our neighbors in need—whose crisis is presented by Vincentians from our Conference—and as stewards of our Parishioners' support.
- 3. For Past Officers, Presidents, and Long-Time Vincentians
 Together, we will map from our collective experience: Who are today's poor? What are their needs? Are we meeting them? And how can we, as a Society, be more effective at seeing the Face of Christ in the poor and being the Face of Christ to the poor?

We are now in our third month of reviewing available resources for our Vincentians and Conferences, along with guidance on how to access them. In August, we began with an overview of the St. Vincent de Paul Contra Costa County website and how to utilize its resources. In September, we highlighted the process for donating and requesting safe, working vehicles through the SVDP Contra Costa Auto Donation Program, emphasizing how having reliable transportation can be the difference between stability and homelessness.

This month, in October, our Resource Workshop will focus on accessing dental care services through Dentist on Wheels, a vital partner at the Family Resource Center in Pittsburg. This incredible program has provided over 50 root canals in the past year alone.

And just a friendly reminder: there's only one time you need to jump on a Zoom call—when you want to, when you don't want to, and Tuesdays at 10:00 AM.


















