### **BOOK REVIEW - SCARCITY**


Have you ever completed a home visit and found yourself asking, "What were they thinking?" According to the authors of *Scarcity*, our neighbors in need are thinking exactly as we would if we were in their situation.

Their research reveals that when people face scarcity—whether it's a lack of money, food, time, or something else—they develop tunnel vision. They focus solely on their immediate problem. It doesn't matter if they are Princeton students or a struggling family; when scarcity strikes, their behavior is the same.

This mindset often drives people to solve their immediate issues without considering future consequences. I witnessed this firsthand during a week with my daughter and her newly potty-trained child. The moment my granddaughter indicated she needed the bathroom, my daughter would drop everything—literally rushing like OJ Simpson through the airport. Nothing was more urgent, and no obstacles mattered.

In a similar way, when someone gets a 48-hour shutoff notice from PG&E, they panic. They might take out a payday loan to keep their power on, even if it leads to bigger financial trouble later. In that moment, the future doesn't matter. What matters is fixing the urgent problem right now.



For the past 15 years, Vincentians have transformed the Free Dining Room and Community Center in Pittsburg each Thanksgiving into a welcoming, warm space where our neighbors feel valued. We close off the cul-de-sac, set up tents, serve hot chocolate, and offer hygiene kits. Most importantly, we bring our time and attention, honoring each guest as a person of dignity and worth.

With a Homemade gourmet, sit-down meal and the warmth of a new coat, we come together to share Thanksgiving as a family.

Last year, one of our friends handcrafted rosaries and chaplets for guests and participants to take as mementos of the day. This year,

that same family has lovingly prepared 250 scarves with handwritten notes from young people across the county.





Each personal note serves as a reminder of our shared community and Christ's care.

ONE – WHY?

New members have a real challenge before them when they join a Conference. There is a tremendous amount of "stuff" that they have to learn: who the other members are, principles and history of the Society, spirituality, how to do home visits, where everything is, what and when to do something, and what and when not to. It can all be very confusing. Actually, it can all be confusing to members who have been around for a while, as well. That is why it is important to have a set of Conference guidelines.

That is one of the most frustrating things about being a member – especially a new one. Not knowing what to do and/or being criticized for doing something the wrong way can be very humiliating. It would all be much simpler if all those ways and things were written down somewhere. They can be. They should be.

And, the most organized and well-run Conferences have a set of written guidelines that are available to all members. They are not just a set of rules that have been accumulated over the years, they are a formal set of guidelines that have been defined, organized, and presented in a form that is convenient to use, easy to understand, readily accessible to all members, and approved by consensus.


Without the written guidelines, members will continue to scratch their heads—some even leaving the Conference. Without the written guidelines, people will give their own interpretation of what is the proper way because that's how they remember being taught.

Second Apparition of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal

November 27, is the Feast of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. It was on this day in 1830 that the Blessed Mother appeared to St. Catherine Laboure in the Motherhouse Chapel of the Daughters of Charity in Paris, France. Catherine was a seminary sister at the time. During this apparition, Mary asked Catherine to "have a medal struck after this model. All who wear it will receive great graces: they shall wear it around their neck. Great graces will abound for those who wear it with confidence."



The symbols on the medal summarize the mysteries of the Christian faith. The front side of the medal pictures Mary with rays of light coming down from her hands. She is standing on half of the globe with her foot crushing a serpent. She told Catherine, "These rays are a symbol of the graces that I pour on those who ask of them of me." In the oval surrounding the image is the prayer, "O Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to you." On the reverse side of the medal is the letter M surmounted on a cross and below it, a heart of Jesus with a crown of thorns and the heart of Mary pierced by a sword. Around the images are 12 stars.
