Bob Liles Corner BOOK REVIEW – SCARCITY - Mullainathan & Shafir – Part 3 By Bob Liles

In Chennai, India there is a huge market place with over 2,500 markets. Before it opens the poorest of the poor borrow \$20. Then they buy select items at the market and sell them alongside the road as people walk to the market.

They will make about \$22, of which \$21 goes to the lender and they are left with \$1. If the vendor saved ten cents a day, after about 50 days the vendor would have saved \$20 and would no longer have to borrow money every day. Now their profit would be \$2/day which doubles the vendor's income. But they don't do that.

Probably because when you live on one dollar a day cutting spending back by ten cents is a major reduction. So, the authors gave about one hundred of these vendors \$20. Now they did not need to borrow any money nor pay any interest.

If they kept doing what they were doing they would make twice as much money every day. At first it started out great and the vendors enjoyed their new larger income.

But one by one they made decisions to overspend and after one year all of them were back at the same place they were prior to being given the \$20.

Does this suggest that the poor will always be with us and that, despite our best efforts to assist them, they will ultimately return to their previous state?

Does this mean that it is their own fault that they are poor, and if they behaved like us, they wouldn't be poor anymore?

Not really. Have you ever been on a diet and cheated even once on the diet? Did you make some New Year's resolutions or decide to give up something for Lent, and didn't follow through 100%? The authors conducted studies to show that all of us would have behaved similarly to the vendors. The only difference is that we have so much that if we eat that one piece of cake or break our New Year's resolution, nothing drastic will happen. In the case of the vendors, they are living so close to the edge of the cliff that one teeny weeny mistake puts them over the edge, and no human is capable of being so disciplined that they will never mess up.




